## Midwestern Battleground State Poll Crosstabs October 13-21, 2020

University of Wisconsin-Madison

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Surveys of voting age adults were conducted by YouGov under the direction of the Elections Research Center. YouGov is a leading marketing and polling firm that conducts surveys for news outlets such as CBS News, the Economist, and the Huffington Post. Interviews were conducted online with respondents selected from YouGov's opt-in panel. The sample was selected and weighted to reflect the adult population in each state based on gender, age, race, and education.

The sample sizes were 800 in Michigan (MOE is +/- 3.98), 800 in Pennsylvania (MOE is +/- 4.20), and 800 in Wisconsin (MOE is +/- 3.73). More results and information about the poll are available on the Elections Research Center's web site: [elections.wisc.edu](http://elections.wisc.edu).

The Elections Research Center conducted surveys in Michigan, Pennsylvania, and Wisconsin on October 13-21, 2020 that asked respondent who they plan to vote for in the general election. Among other items, the survey asked respondents about the most important issue facing the country, opinions about Trump, campaign contact, and the nomination of Amy Coney Barrett. This document includes crosstabulations for all respondents unless otherwise stated. The numbers in each cell represent the percentage of registered voters in that demographic category who gave that response. The last column in each table labeled "n" contains the number of observations in that demographic category. We urge readers to use caution in drawing conclusions from demographic categories with a small number of respondents.
